Graves therefore decided to visit that stretch of the river, which he had known intimately as a youth. *Goodbye to a River* is his account of that farewell canoe voyage. As he braves rapids and fatigue and the fickle autumn weather, he muses upon old blood feuds of the region and violent skirmishes with native tribes, and retells wild stories of courage and cowardice and deceit that shaped both the river's people and the land during frontier times and later. Nearly half a century after its initial publication, *Goodbye to a River* is a true American classic, a vivid narrative about an exciting journey and a powerful tribute to a vanishing way of life and its ever-changing natural environment.

**Crank** Daniel Whitman 2006-08-23 *Crank* was written over a 30-year period, and covers the experiences of 40. Its "fiction" and "non-fiction" mix retains no more purity than does Mann or Conrad or the U.S. News. Like strophic patterns of the French chanson, they stood the logic upright and sustained the tale, never diving for the observer's heart but gaining ground on it by inadvertence.
